Call for Papers

Examining Hegel's Idea of Self-Determination: From Actuality to Concept

A three-day conference on June 6-8, 2019 at the University of Warwick

This conference aims to philosophically examine the ideas of actuality and concept, as it features in Hegel's seminal work, *The Science of Logic*. Actuality is the final section in the second division of the *Logic*, concerning the logic of philosophically key concepts of modality, substantiality, necessity, causality. It is on the basis of these, Hegel argues, that the logic of concept, freedom or self-determination emerges. Hegel is in an important sense a realist since causal connections or structures of necessity are logically necessary for what will become the subjective logic. And yet, how does one precisely understand the subjective logic without reducing it simply to relations of the objective, whilst doing justice to the latter's logic of necessity and causality?

Following its predecessor, the conference aims to closely examine the logical structures that are developed in the last part of Hegel's Doctrine of Essence—Actuality—and the structures developed in the first part of the Doctrine of the Concept. Special attention will be given to the crucial transition between these two domains. As before, exegetical papers are principally preferred, but we also welcome contributions that engage Hegel's notion of essence, actuality, and concept, jointly with other philosophical theories and systems.
